Picture books can be used in the middle school and high school for many reasons. They are simple ways to introduce a topic, reinforce the current topic under discussion, illustrate a given topic and as a way to bring literature into the non-English content areas. An excellent way to use picture books is to read the book and then have the students respond – whether through various forms of writing, through art, or through discussion. If you would like to use more picture books in your classroom, please feel free to come by the library and I can help you discover ways to use them in your room.

### CODES:

0 – No words

1 – Few words on a page, can easily be read as a starter.

2 – More words, can be easily read and discussed in a period.

3 – Many words; complicated, would lead to great, in-depth discussion.

4 – A complex book that can only be read a little at a time, or a teacher may only want to read one or two pages (no code – book was not on the shelf when I went to code)

P – Photographs for illustrations

Louie, Ai-Ling. Yeh-Shen : a Cinderella story from China. New York : Philomel Books, c1982. A young Chinese girl overcomes the wickedness of her stepsister and stepmother to become the bride of a prince.

Lum, Darrell H. Y. The golden slipper : a Vietnamese legend. [Mahwah, N.J.] : Troll Associates, c1994. A variation on the Cinderella story, in which a kind-hearted young woman meets her prince with the help of animals she has befriended.

Mah, Adeline Yen, 1937-. *Chinese Cinderella : the true story of an unwanted daughter*. New York : Delacorte Press, 1999. The author tells the story of her painful childhood in China where she lived until the age of fourteen with her father, stepmother, and siblings, all of whom considered her bad luck because her mother died shortly after giving birth to her.

Mehta, Lila. *The enchanted anklet : a Cinderella story from India*. Toronto, Ont., Canada : Lilmur, c1985.

Minters, Frances. *Cinder-Elly*. Viking, c1994. In this rap version of the traditional fairy tale, the overworked younger sister gets to go to a basketball game and meets a star player, Prince Charming.

Nguyen, Thi Nhuan. *Tam Cam : a Vietnamese Cinderella story*. San Jose, CA : The Gioi Publishing. Tam is misused by her stepmother and her stepsister Cam. With the help of a friendly god and a fish, Tam captures her prince in this Vietnamese version of Cinderella.

Perlman, Janet, 1954-. *Cinderella Penguin : or, the little glass flipper*. Puffin Books, 1995, c1992. Cinderella Penguin wishes to go to the ball like her evil stepsisters, so the Great Fairy Penguin turns Cinderella Penguin from sooty bird into every Penguin Prince's dreamboat.

Pollock, Penny. *The Turkey Girl : a Zuni Cinderella story*. 1st ed. Little, Brown, c1996. In this Indian variant of a familiar story, some turkeys make a gown of feathers for the poor girl who tends them so that she can participate in a sacred dance, but they desert her when she fails to return as promised.

San Souci, Robert D. *Cendrillon : a Caribbean Cinderella*. Simon & Schuster Books for Young Readers, 1998. A Creole variant of the familiar Cinderella tale set in the Caribbean and narrated by the godmother who helps Cendrillon find true love.

San Souci, Robert D. *Little gold star : a Spanish American Cinderella tale*. New York : HarperCollins, c2000. A Spanish American retelling of the familiar story of a kind girl who is mistreated by her jealous stepmother and stepsisters. In this version, the Virgin Mary replaces the traditional fairy godmother.

San Souci, Robert D. *Sootface : an Ojibwa Cinderella story*. Dell, 1997, c1994. Although she is mocked and mistreated by her two older sisters, an Indian maiden wins a mighty invisible warrior for her husband with her kind and honest heart.

Schroeder, Alan. *Smoky Mountain Rose : an Appalachian Cinderella*. 1st ed. Dial Books for Young Readers, c1997. In this variation on the Cinderella story, based on the Charles Perrault version but set in the Smoky Mountains, Rose loses her glass slipper at a party given by the rich feller on the other side of the creek.

Silverman, Erica. *Raisel's riddle*. Sunburst ed. [New York] : Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2003, c1999. Presents a Jewish version of the Cinderella story, in which a poor but educated young woman captivates her Prince Charming—a rabbi's son—at a Purim ball.
